# McSAM Awards winners announced

The Dallas Builders Association has announced winners of its 43rd Annual McSAM Awards, presented April 9 in partnership with Hillwood Communities.

The McSAM Awards are held each year to recognize "maximum creativity in sales and marketing." More than 400 entries were received this year, and winners were named in 62 categories.

U.S. Olympian and former NFL player Johnny Quinn was the master of ceremonies for the awards gala held at the Renaissance Dallas Addison Hotel.

In the industry-judged awards, M/I Homes was named the McSAM Builder of the Year, Hillwood Communities was named Developer of the Year and Emory Park by Centre Living Homes was named Builder Neighborhood of

Industry experts from around the country including builders, architects, interior designers and new home marketing professionals judged the awards.

Sales trainer and author Mar'Sue Haffner was honored with the Legend of Sales & Marketing Award, which recognizes a visionary leader who has contributed to the advancement of the housing industry on a national scale through the consistent sharing of knowledge and mentoring of others. Highland Homes won the prestigious People's Choice Builder of the Year honors. Harvest by Hillwood Communities was named People's Choice Community of the Year.

The People's Choice competition rewards builders and developers based on consumer voting. To identify the

Dallas BA President Andrew Pieper with Hillwood Communities has been named to Professional Builder magazine's 40 Under 40 Class

According to ProBuilder, the honor "recognizes the brightest young talent and next-generation leaders and innovators in the home building industry. This year's Under 40 rising stars are pushing the boundaries both of personal and professional accomplishment, tapping a range of skills, with a good dose of grit, ingenuity, adaptability, and a keen understanding of business and the ability to inspire and lead a team."

Nominations are judged by the editors of ProBuilder, who look for successful and well-rounded individuals under the age of 40.

Pieper joined Hillwood Commu-

nities in 2009 after graduating from SMU. He was voted by his peers as the company's Associate of the Year in 2012. After managing successively



larger projects, he was promoted in 2018 to vice president and project manager of Pecan Square, a 3,000-unit community that won Master-Planned Community of the Year and People's Choice Community of the Year in 2021 in the Dallas BA's McSAM Awards. He is currently the project manager for Hunter Ranch in Denton, a 3,000-acre site in predevelopment.

# Dallas permitting saga hits 'inflection point'

The Dallas BA continues to help numerous members each day facing costly permitting delays at the City of Dallas. More than two years since the onset of the pandemic and a failed move to an online permitting system, the city and that's why my focus is on the city council has now given the city manager a deadline to solve the problem.

In a letter sent by Councilwoman Paula Blackmon, who Mayor Eric Johnson appointed to lead his task force on the matter, the city manager is requested to produce a detailed plan at a full council briefing on May 18.

Blackmon told D Magazine, "We're getting to the point where we have to either blow it all up or fix what we have. It's an archaic system we've bandaged and patched. It's finally caught up with us."

"On one hand I hear every day from builders losing thousands of dollars due to delays and escalating costs as this crisis lingers on," said Dallas BA Executive Officer Phil Crone. "On the other hand, I see and appreciate the efforts being taken by Will Mundinger to put this thing back together and several staff members on individual projects we send them. There is some progress underway, but we are nearing an inflection point on whether they get the job done or we drift further into the abyss."

Mundinger, a former Goldman

Sachs executive, was appointed last year by the city manager to solve the problem. "I think Will is doing everything he can," Crone said. "I don't think he's getting the resources he needs, though, manager. He's the one person in this city with the power to fix this, and I'm glad to see the council holding him accountable."


Crone added that builders need to be strong advocates for their projects and take personal responsibility for their own permits. "I've seen many builders using someone who claims to be a permit expediter and end up facing more delays with less information about their project because those third parties are not keeping up with a fast-moving situation," he said. "At this moment, plan to permit it yourself through the ProjectDox software, expect it to take at least 8 weeks, stay on top of your application as it moves from prescreen to plan review and be ready to contact us if you suspect it is stuck or you don't know where it is."

The city manager's plan is expected to contain several recommendations that the Dallas BA and other industry groups have offered over the past few months. The Association will continue to work closely with staff on

### No Spring Break for Association Advocacy

Members have another opportunity to support advocacy efforts in May. Registration is now open for the May 18 HOMEPAC Shootout, the Association's clay shoot to benefit HOMEPAC of Greater Dallas. This is a fun opportunity to support Dallas BA advocacy and enjoy the outdoors.

The clay shoot will be hosted at the famed Elm Fork Shooting Sports facilities in Dallas. The event will begin with registration and breakfast at 8 a.m., followed by the clay shoot at 9 a.m. Lunch and posting of results will follow the shoot. The event format will be 4-person teams.

Participant entry is \$150 per shooter, which includes breakfast, lunch and beverages. You can also register a team of four for \$600. Shooters must provide their own ammunition (20 or 12 gauge), as well as eye and ear protection.

Partnerships are also available, with five levels to choose from. Participant registration, as well as partnership information and forms can be found on the Dallas BA member website at https:// dallasbuilders.org/calendar/.

Dallas BA is monitoring the City of Dallas' update to building ordinances. The item was on a recent consent agenda for city council, but after hearing concerns from Dallas BA and fellow stakeholders, it was pulled for further explanation.

As it pertains to the city's one- and two-family dwelling code, city staff has updated stakeholders that there are proposed changes to four specific sections

There are two types of changes involved: 1) Adoption of Tiny House provisions, taken from the 2021 International Residential Code (IRC), and 2) related updates between the 2015 and 2021 code editions. Dallas BA is concerned about the alternative compliance requirements listed for Tiny Houses, which include requirements for the home to use solar, wind or other renewable energy sources to supply not less than 90 percent of the structure's energy and service water heating.

The remainder of the one- and twofamily dwelling code is still based on the 2015 IRC with the inclusion of regional amendments from the North Central Texas Council of Governments' Regional Codes Coordinating Committee, of which Dallas BA is a voting member.

So, these are minor changes to address needed areas until Dallas makes its full jump to the 2021 IRC. There are also changes to Dallas' use of the 2015 International Building Code (IBC), including adoption of Mass Timber provisions taken from the 2021 IBC and updates between the code editions.

Dallas is updating to the 2020 NEC with the use of COG amendments. The city is also updating its version of the International Existing Building Code. There are local recommendations that involve input from a local historic preservation group. However, the city indicates that the 2021 IEBC is amended to match the intent of the initially adopted Dallas Existing Building Code to improve on its goal of giving building owners greater flexibility to use their buildings without making the entire building meet costly newer codes that are more appropriate for new construction projects.

In Denton, Dallas BA continues to weigh in on the amending of park dedication fee-in-lieu and park development fees. Comments and concerns submitted by Dallas BA in recent park board and city council meetings have already resulted in some needed language changes to the proposed ordinance, and more work is being done. Council is expected to bring the issue back as early as May.

Dallas BA recently submitted comments following a review of updated building codes, as Denton looks to move to the next cycle. Denton is keeping many of their local amendments from the previous code cycle, as well as making use of needed COG amendments. Builders should expect those codes to go into effect on June 1.

Builders and developers should remain aware of the discussion in Denton regarding roadway impact fees. The fees, first discussed in 2015, and implemented in 2016, are due for revision and update. The original fees were introduced at a lower rate when Dallas BA voiced concern about sticker shock for new home prices. Now, with inflation and material costs posing a threat everywhere, it will be important for Denton City Council to keep in mind the overall cost.

Denton is still working on the update for its thoroughfare masterplan, so


it may be some time before the discussion reaches the city council.


Across Texas, the May 7 election ballot will have two state constitutional amendments supported by the Texas Association of Builders and Dallas BA. Proposition 1 reduces the limitation on property taxes for a person who is elderly or disabled. The legislation is intended to provide property tax relief and make housing affordable for some of the most vulnerable in the state. Proposition 2 raises the residence homestead exemption to \$40,000. The legislation includes a temporary provision that retroactively sets the increase to begin on Jan. 1, 2022.

At the national level, many of you have joined thousands of other NAHB members from around the county in signing on to an important letter from NAHB to the Biden Administration. The letter urges the White House to address key issues that, if left unaddressed, can pose a threat to the current housing and economic expansion.

Citing the current high-inflation environment, NAHB has urged President Biden to suspend all tariffs on Canadian softwood lumber, quickly move into negotiations for a long-term softwood lumber agreement and seek to remedy supply chain bottlenecks that impact the availability of needed building materials. NAHB's letter also urges the reduction of burdensome regulations that harm housing affordability.

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# HB 3215 proves its worth as energy codes ratchet up

the rest of the year, many area municipalities will begin updating their building and residential codes to the 2021 versions.

As a part of those updates, builders will have to contend with the 2021 International Energy Conservation Code (IECC), which contains many potentially costly provisions.

House Bill 3215, signed into law last June and now codified in Chapter 388 of the Texas Health and Safety Code now recognizes the Home Energy Rating System (HERS) Index scores as a standalone compliance pathway and untangles it from the current ICC/ IRC versions of the energy rating index (ERI) pathway.

A couple other benefits of the new law is that it will remain on the books for at least 10 years before the state revisits it. Also, cities must accept this pathway

Beginning now and throughout as an energy code compliance method because it is hard coded the same way as the ENERGY STAR® for Homes Certification.

Homes using this pathway must also meet the 2018 IECC's building envelope provisions. That includes the more flexible UA Alternative. This is significant because the flexibility offered by that approach allows for more innovation and better-empowers builders to cope with supply chain challenges.

"Getting code language through the legislature can be a challenge due to competing interests and their technical nature being beyond the understanding of those not in our industry," said Dallas BA Executive Officer Phil Crone. "All told though, they did a pretty good job with this bill and a recently-released legislative intent letter."

In early April, bill author Rep.

Charlie Geren released a letter clearing up some confusion that arose in informational webinars related to the bill. "Even though it has been on the books for several months, I anticipate a much greater focus on this alternative pathway when it is compared to the 2021 IECC, especially for builders in Climate Zone 3," said James Rodriguez of Fox Energy Specialists. "HB 3215 is a pretty rigorous benchmark in its own right, but the performance comes with much more flexibility."

Members with questions or concerns about the 2021 code adoption process are encouraged to contact the Dallas BA and visit the North Central Texas Council of Governments website. The site lists the recommended amendments of the Regional Codes Coordinating Committee that Association representatives have served on for many years.
